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# Schools to lose 34.5 positions

Whitfield County school officials expect 12 fewer full-time elementary school teaching positions for next year, five fewer middle school positions and 17.5 fewer high school positions.

"It's based on FTE (full-time equivalent) counts (which are closely tied to the number of students) and class size," said spokesman Eric Beavers.

Superintendent Katie Brochu

said last week that the number of teachers the school system expects to receive state funding for next year will likely decrease by 34.5. The decrease comes primarily because class sizes in most grade levels will increase by one student next year.

The teaching reductions, along with plans to hire 13 fewer para-professionals, will save about \$4.17 million, officials said. The general fund budget for the 2009 fiscal year, which ends June 30, is \$108.85 million. Next year's bud-

get is still a work in progress.

The system's 55 part-time employees have also been put on notice that they might not have jobs next year depending on the system's needs when school starts.

School officials said they expect to be able to reduce the number of teachers on payroll by not filling most of the normal vacancies that occur through retirement, resignations and changing positions within the system.

School officials expect \$6.4 million less in state money for the

next fiscal year. However, that number isn't final until the Legislature approves a state budget.

Other areas of cost savings for Whitfield schools include discontinuing board-paid dental and life insurance benefits to employees, leaving central office vacancies unfilled, and removing supplements for teachers who serve more than one school, officials said. The cost savings on those moves wasn't immediately available Wednesday evening.

## Man, 76, arrested for pot

A 76-year-old man was arrested for selling marijuana on Wednesday by detectives with the Whitfield County Sheriff's Office drug unit.



**Turnquist** Kenneth Lee Turnquist of 2807 Jelly Jones Road in Chatsworth was charged with possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana with intent to distribute. During his arrest at 494 Burgess Road in Dalton, Jeffery Scott Harrison, 34, of that residence, was charged with possession of marijuana and illegal possession of alprazolam, also known as Xanax.



"We were conducting an ongoing investigation on the sale of marijuana at the residence and were able to purchase a quantity from Mr. Turnquist," said Sgt. Scott McAllister, head of the drug unit. "When we went back to make the arrest we searched the residence and found marijuana and Xanax in the bedroom of Mr. Harrison. He did not have a prescription for the Xanax."

Officers also found \$5,750 in cash, which they hope to seize through the district attorney's office.

McAllister said it appeared Turnquist spent a few days at a time at each residence.

The Murray County Sheriff's Office has a bench warrant out for Turnquist for violation of the Georgia Controlled Substances Act dating back to Jan. 14. He remains in the Whitfield County Jail and is set for a bond hearing in Superior Court on Friday. Harrison bonded out of jail Wednesday afternoon. A phone number for him could not be found.

## Railroad work closing intersections

Work crews are giving the Dalton stretch of the Norfolk Southern railway a bit of a face lift. Several intersections are expected to be closed as the work continues.

"We've got a track gang of somewhere between 85 and 100 people replacing the track as it

runs through Dalton. The work began at South Freeport Road, and it will end at Five Springs Road," said railroad spokesman Robin Chapman.

All told, the crew will be replacing a little over seven miles of track. It's the first time the track has been completely replaced like this in Dalton in some 15 years.

"They'll be closing intersec-

tions as they go along, and we are encouraging people to use the overpasses at the north bypass, Waugh Street, Gordon Street and the south bypass," said Chapman. "They'll be finishing up Monday or Tuesday."

According to the railroad's Web site, Norfolk Southern has approximately 14,400 miles of track in 20 states, primarily in the Southeast and Midwest.

## Bond hearing continued for murder suspect

CHATSWORTH — A woman charged with killing her ex-husband will spend another week in jail, her attorney said.

Rhonda Sosebee, 44, was expected to appear in Murray County Superior Court Wednesday morning for a bond hearing. She is charged with murder in the stabbing death of her ex-husband, Steven Lee Young, 37, at his home on Valley Road on Feb. 12 or 13.

Public defender Steve Blevins said injuries Sosebee has sustained — including a gunshot wound in her left leg, a laceration on her thigh, and a partial amputation of her left ring finger — are not healing well.

"It's my understanding that there are still

**Newsman Pace to speak to historical society**

The Whitfield-Murray Historical Society will meet on Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the Brown Center on the Dalton State College campus. Mark Pace, editor emeritus of The Daily Citizen and a 2007 winner of the Society's Preservation Award, will be the guest speaker.

Admission is free. Members of the Historical Society and the public are invited.

Pace retired from The Daily Citizen in March 1982 and joined North Georgia Electric Membership Corp. in what is now the marketing and communications department. In 1986, Pace published "Out of a Dim Era: 50th Anniversary of North Georgia EMC, 1936-1996."

Pace was born in Wauchula, Fla., on June 20, 1914. He began his newspaper career in high school in 1928. He graduated during the Great Depression when jobs were scarce and took his first paying newspaper job with the Hardee County Herald for \$5 per week. Pace has been a news correspondent for the Tampa Tribune, the Associated Press, the Atlanta Constitution and the Chattanooga Times and Free Press.

Pace's career in journal-

ism spanned decades of turmoil and growth in the U.S. and the world, from World War II to Vietnam. He was editor of The Daily Citizen when news of the Kennedy assassination came — literally a stop-the-presses moment.

Pace came to Dalton in October 1945 to work with two local weekly newspapers, The Dalton Citizen and the Dalton News. He was named editor in October or November of that year. Later, the two papers combined into a daily — now The Daily Citizen.

Pace oversaw many local events during his tenure as editor of The Daily Citizen. Dalton Parks and Recreation

Center opened and the Chief Vann House was dedicated and opened to the public in 1958. Pace also saw the boom and growth of the tufted carpet industry in Dalton during the 1960s and 1970s.

Pace is a member of Dalton First Baptist Church and the Dalton Lions Club. He has long been an advocate for Alzheimer's disease, participating in the Memory Walk to raise money and awareness. In later years, he lost his wife, Alva, to Alzheimer's.

Pace and his two daughters, Peggy and Patsy, still consider Dalton their hometown. In fact, after Pace made the decision to move to Dalton, he learned from his parents that the family actually had ties to Dalton. Pace's great-great-grandmother, Madame Bertha Ruhl, once taught music at the old Dalton Female College in the 1880s. During the Civil War, she visited a number of Southern communities to conduct musical benefits for Confederate soldiers.

Pace is currently writing a book for NGEMC's diamond anniversary in 2011. He still writes a column for The Daily Citizen. His gift for biographical and human interest stories, as well as his sociable nature and sense of humor, make for a great storytelling combination.

some bullet fragments in her leg," he said, "and with her other injuries I asked for a continuation of her probation preliminary appearance."

Sheriff's office investigators say Sosebee violated her probation for theft by taking and theft by deception — she pleaded guilty in December — when she visited other states while she was sought for questioning. She also did not report to her probation officer, they said.

Blevins said Sosebee was rescheduled to appear in court next Wednesday. Sheriff Howard Ensley said Sosebee is receiving medical treatments at the jail "on a daily basis."

"She was taken to Erlanger Medical Center (in Chattanooga) the day after her arrest to have a finger partially amputated, and a surgeon has been taking care of the treatment of her gunshot wound," he said. "Our nurse at the jail is also giving her antibiotics and treating her dressings every day."

Ensley would not talk about how Sosebee received the injuries.

The Dalton Area Convention and Visitors Bureau has added the title of Sports Commission. CVB executive director Margaret Thigpen says the name change emphasizes how important the sports market is to the agency. "We want to increase our sports market business — whether it is tournaments, meetings, conventions," said Thigpen. Three juveniles and another teenager were arrested on marijuana charges following an incident at Southeast High School last Friday.

The juveniles were each charged by the Whitfield County Sheriff's Office with possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana on school grounds. As a result of the investigation, Jose Alonso Gandara, 17, of 3797 S. Dixie Road, was charged on Monday with distribution of marijuana, possession of marijuana on school grounds and possession of less than an ounce of marijuana.

Maj. John Gibson with the sheriff's office said it was unclear whether Gandara was a student. Assistant principal David Privett said privacy issues dictated he could not verify whether the juveniles — or Gandara — are students at Southeast, and referred questions to the central office. School system spokesman Eric Beavers did not immediately respond to a

request for information on Wednesday.

A juvenile male student told school counselor Chris Anderson that a friend asked him to hold onto the friend's book bag between periods, according to an

arrest report. When he said it was OK, the other student stuffed his book bag inside his book bag. When he reached into his book bag to get a pencil, he smelled a strong odor of marijuana coming from his friend's bag. He hid the marijuana in a shelf because he did not want himself or his friend to get into trouble. After school he hid the marijuana in some woods off campus, but felt like he needed to tell someone, according to the report.

Anderson took the student to see Privett and school resource officer Melissa

Callahan. Callahan found the marijuana in a plastic bottle where the student told her to look, tested it on campus and found it positive, then contacted detectives.

Gandara got out of jail on a \$5,000 bond on Tuesday. A phone number for him could not be found.

Bobby Hughes, director of the Regional Youth Detention Center (YDC) in Dalton where underage offenders are incarcerated, referred questions to Steve Hayes at the state Department of Juvenile Justice. Hayes said because of state confidentiality policy concerning juveniles he could not verify if the juveniles went to the YDC. Hughes said juveniles are sometimes released to their parents.

According to the drug and alcohol policy of Whitfield County Schools, students in unlawful possession of illegal drugs on school property or at a school function may face "immediate suspension with (a) hearing (and) possible recommendation for expulsion."

## Mom: Rumors about missing son 'not true'

Despite rumors that he has been found, the search will continue for missing boater Brett Thomason around the Conasauga River in southern Whitfield County, his mother says.

Thomason, 19, has been missing since Feb. 19 when he let two friends out of his jon boat near Riverbend Road during an evening trip on the river. The boat was found beached about 75 yards downstream, according to state Department of Natural Resource officials.

Dana Massey, Thomason's mother, said she continues to hear rumors her son has been found and is alive and well.

"A TV station called me (Tuesday) and asked me how I felt since my son had been found," she said. "I just want the public to know the rumors that he has been found are not true, and to let everyone know we're still looking for him."

Massey said a community search will be held this Saturday, weather permitting, beginning at noon at Riverbend Baptist Church on Riverbend Road.

Investigators with the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, Whitfield County Sheriff's Office and DNR say they have searched and followed all leads, to no avail.

"All I can say is the investigation is still ongoing, and we're still looking for Brett," said special agent Dan Sims of the GBI office in Calhoun.

Sheriff Scott Chitwood said Wednesday there were "no new developments" but that the sheriff's office is continuing to follow up on "tips."

"We requested helicopter assistance last Saturday and they had mechanical problems," said Capt. Carroll Chastain, a DNR regional supervisor in Calhoun. "We hope we can get them in the air this Saturday to search the river. They may be able to see something we can't see."

Chastain said the river search will probably not involve "dragging and poking," but having crews make runs up and down stretches of the tributary looking for evidence of Thomason.

## No special taxes for AIG bonuses

Congress and the White House are in high dudgeon over AIG's payment of \$165 million in year-end bonuses even as the company was relying on taxpayers to keep it afloat.

However righteous that anger, it doesn't excuse one particular plan under consideration to recoup those bonuses — punitive, confiscatory taxation aimed at a small group of individuals.

The Senate is considering an excise tax of up to 95 percent on bonuses of \$1 million or more paid to 73 AIG executives. The House has a plan that would tax the bonuses at 100 percent. And the White House says it is open to the idea of a special tax aimed at AIG's top earners.

This is a bad precedent, bad tax policy and prone to the law of unintended consequences.

Congress is even now wrestling with the consequences of trying to target a small group for special taxation. In 1969, spurred by the revelation that 155 high-income families and individuals had legally paid no income tax, Congress passed the alternative minimum tax, which morphed into a complicated parallel tax system that has to be patched annually to keep it from ensnaring millions of middle-income taxpayers.

In 1990, Congress enacted a luxury tax aimed at the purchasers of expensive cars, boats, aircraft, jewelry and furs. The tax proved difficult to administer, never raised the expected revenue and was eventually repealed — but not before it almost killed Florida's yacht-building industry.

One has to wonder how much of this official outrage over the bonuses is feigned. President Obama says he only learned about them last Thursday, but if he didn't know about them, he should have.

According to The Associated Press, the plan to pay the bonuses was publicized last fall and even included in a November SEC filing. The Wall Street Journal says it was also in a filing made last May. In January, two House members wrote to Treasury and the Federal Reserve to protest the bonuses. AP says the Obama team and Congress passed up an opportunity to revoke the bonuses through the bailout bill. There was such a provision, but it was dropped at the last minute.

The upshot is that the Obama administration, the Bush administration and Congress all knew about the bonus plans. Distorting the tax code is an unacceptable way to make up for that lack of attention.

Reportedly, AIG is planning a \$231 million round of bonuses, to be paid next year. Plenty of time for the Obama team to get moving.

# Property lost

Ask the average person which is the correct answer to the following question: Which president gave the biggest tax cuts for the rich — Reagan or Bush? I would bet the rent money that you would not get the correct response, which is: Presidents have no taxing authority. Article I, Section 8 of the U.S. Constitution says: "The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises." I know that many politicians and news media people read my column. How do we characterize them if they continue to speak of presidents cutting or raising taxes?

Another tax question: If there's an imposition of a property tax on your land, who pays the tax? I guarantee you that land does not pay taxes; only people pay taxes. That means a tax on your land is a tax on you. You say, "Williams, that's pretty elementary, isn't it?" But what do you say to a politician or news media people who propose increasing corporate taxes as means to get rich corporations to pay their rightful share of government? They should be told that they speak nonsense because corporations, like land, do not pay taxes; only people pay taxes.

If a tax is levied on a corporation, and if it is to survive, it must raise the price of its product, or lower dividends or lay off workers. In each case, it is people, not some legal fiction called a corporation, who bear the burden of any

levied does not necessarily bear the burden of the tax. Some of the tax burden can be shifted to another party. That's precisely what corporations do and as such they are merely government tax collectors.

Here's another tax question: Which worker receives the higher pay: a worker on a road construction project moving dirt with a shovel or a worker moving dirt atop a giant earthmover? If you said the guy on the earthmover, go to the head of the class. But why? It's not because he's unionized or that employers just love earthmover operators. It's because having more capital (tools) makes him more productive and therefore earn higher wages.

It's not rocket science to conclude that whatever lowers the cost of capital formation enables workers to have more capital to work with and enjoy higher wages. Policies that raise the cost of capital formation such as capital gains taxes, low depreciation allowances and high corporate income taxes, and

tax levied on the corporation. An important subject area in economics called tax incidence says that the entity upon whom a tax is

thereby reducing capital formation, serves neither the interests of workers, investors nor consumers. Taxes also reduce transactions. I need my computer repaired. You and I agree that the job is worth \$200. Suppose there's the imposition of a 30 percent income tax on you. That means you would net only \$140 and might refuse the job. You might suggest that if I were willing to pay you \$285 you would do the job because at that price your after-tax earnings will be \$200 — what doing the job is worth to you. There's a problem. The repair job was worth \$200 to me, not \$285. So it's my turn to say the heck with it, or would we and society be better off if you and I agreed to the repair job but did not tell anybody? I'd say yes, but we'd be criminals.

You might wonder how congressmen can get away with taxes and other measures that reduce our prosperity potential. Part of the answer is the anti-business climate promoted in academia and the news media. The more important reason is that prosperity foregone is invisible. In other words, we can never tell how much richer we would have been without today's level of congressional interference in our lives and therefore don't fight it as much as we should.


## Left calling for 'shared sacrifice'

In these very tough economic times, the left is calling for "shared sacrifice," which is code for soaking affluent folks as much as possible. You may have heard some radio ads paid for by the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) beseeching Americans to support higher taxes on corporations and the wealthy so we can all "share" the economic pain.

That union is a great supporter of far-left causes like open borders, amnesty for illegal aliens and giant government entitlement programs. In addition, the SEIU has taken the lead in attacking the nonunion Wal-Mart corporation and calling for non-secret ballots in union voting. The SEIU is a

socialist outfit right down the line. The union doesn't just want you to share their sacrifice, whatever that may be; they want to take your furniture. One of the SEIU's favorite politicians is Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi. They love her. But these days it doesn't look like Pelosi is doing much sacrificing. According to documents obtained by the watchdog group Judicial Watch through the Freedom of Information Act, Pelosi is racking up enormous mileage on Air Force Gulfstream V jets, costing the taxpayers millions.

My staff asked Pelosi spokesman Brendan Daly exactly how many Air Force jets she's used since becoming speaker in January 2007. Daly said he didn't have that information.

Oh. It seems to me that with many Americans getting hammered financially and trillions of dollars being

spent to counter the recession, Speaker Pelosi might want to keep track of her taxpayer-funded trips. Am I wrong?

To be fair, Pelosi is legally entitled to the perk. After 9/11, the government decided that the speaker of the House, third in line for the presidency, should not fly commercial. OK. But does anyone think Pelosi is not milking this jet deal? Anyone?

If that's shared sacrifice, I would like to become the speaker's friend. After all, she recently flew to Rome with an entourage. I assume it was aboard an Air Force jet, but I don't know for sure because even though I asked, Pelosi won't tell. (By the way, the pope scolded Pelosi over abortion during their meeting.)

Are you feeling the sacrifice being made by Pelosi and many other politicians who are living large on the Hill? I'm not feeling it. But like the SEIU, I believe that sharing is good. And with my tax rates going up big time, I have no doubt I'll soon be paying more than my share.

**AIG execs to return bonuses**

WASHINGTON — Under intense pressure from the Obama administration and Congress, the head of bailed-out insurance giant AIG declared Wednesday that some of the firm's executives have begun returning all or part of bonuses totaling \$165 million. Edward Liddy, brought in last year to oversee a company that has received \$182 billion in federal bailout funds, offered no details. Buffeted by congressional outrage, he said he was angry, too, but did not respond directly when advised in pungent terms to pay to the Treasury all the money handed out last weekend in "retention payments."

**Fed will buy up to \$300B in bonds**

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve announced Wednesday that it will inject about \$1 trillion into the economy in a bold effort to help the battered housing market and lift the country out of recession. At the same time, the Fed left a key short-term bank lending rate at a record low of between zero and 0.25 percent. Economists predict the Fed will hold the rate in that zone for the rest of this year and for most — if not all — of next year. In a new program, the Fed said it will buy up to \$300 billion of long-term bonds, a move that should boost Treasury prices and drive down their rates. That would ripple through and lower rates on other kinds of debt. The last time the Fed set out to influence long-term interest rates was during the 1960s.

**'American Taliban' may tell his story**

INDIANAPOLIS — Federal prison officials are easing restrictions on American-born Taliban soldier John Walker Lindh, moves that his attorney said Wednesday will allow Lindh to tell his story for the first time. U.S. Bureau of Prisons spokesman Dean Boyd said the restrictions on Lindh, 28, will expire Friday. He said the current limits Lindh faces are not public and he cannot discuss them. Lindh is serving a 20-year sentence for aiding Afghanistan's now-defunct Taliban government. He was captured in Afghanistan in November 2001 by U.S. forces sent to topple the Taliban after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

**State chamber focusing on key issues, working with elected leaders**

With the news dominated by the economy and our minds distracted by what's happening to our 401(k)s, it is easy to lose sight of some very important things happening right here at home.

Over the next few weeks, the Georgia General Assembly will be meeting to make final decisions on a number of critical issues that will have a direct impact on our state's families, businesses and communities.

As the state's largest business advocacy organization, the Georgia Chamber of Commerce is working closely with our elected leaders to ensure that legislation is passed that will address current and future needs in key areas such as transportation, health care, education and economic development — bills that will help Georgia maintain the business friendly environment that has allowed our state to thrive and will ensure that we are ready to maximize on economic recovery.

First and foremost, no company can survive without quality workers, which is why the Georgia Chamber is committed to education and work force development. A number of bills have been introduced this year to encourage excellence and ensure accountability in our schools, including a Senate measure to better define the roles, responsibilities and training requirements for local school boards and House proposals to create incentives for high performing teachers. Recognizing that not every student is the same, innovative legislation is also under debate that would allow more high school students to take post-secondary classes and strengthen Georgia's career academy program.

There is no question that transportation has been and will continue to be vital to Georgia. Our location on the east coast, extensive railroad network and world-class ports and airport have allowed business to thrive. That said, our investment in infrastructure is woefully behind and must be addressed in a way that relieves congestion, allows for the efficient movement of cargo, ensures safety and allows communities to prepare for future growth. Two funding proposals are currently being considered, and the Georgia Chamber of Commerce remains hopeful that a consensus will be reached this year. Equally important are efforts to create a transportation governance structure in which our citizens can be confident that their needs are being met in a cost-efficient, timely man-

ner. One of the most critical needs being addressed this year is adequate, state-wide trauma care. The facts speak for themselves. While a state of Georgia's size should have 25 to 30 trauma centers, only 15 of our hospitals are designated as such. This means that millions of Georgians live and work too far away to receive critical treatment during the "golden hour" when the chance of survival is at its highest. Each and every one of us is at risk of being involved in a traumatic accident, with vehicle and workplace incidents ranking as the No. 1 and No. 2 causes. Both chambers have considered the creation of a \$10 vehicle tag fee that would raise approximately \$80 million per year for trauma care, enough to create and maintain an effective network.

Another key issue to watch is Medicaid reimbursement. Our hospitals are already woefully underpaid for the services they provide and current proposals would cut the level of reimbursement even further, creating a real threat to the health of hospitals and therefore communities throughout the state. The Georgia Chamber strongly supports increased reimbursement for Medicaid and PeachCare and hopes that our leaders will use federal funds received from the stimulus to help close this critical funding gap.

Finally, in this economy, few things are more important than keeping businesses healthy and creating jobs. The Georgia Chamber is working closely with legislators on a number of proposals that would benefit businesses throughout the state, foster job creation, and modify certain tax credits to better fit today's economy. The JOBS Act of 2009 includes tax credits for new employees hired, eliminates the state inventory tax and the state sales tax deposit, and temporarily suspends incorporation filing fees. Changes proposed for the BEST Act include tax credits for higher paying jobs, research and development, imports and exports through Georgia's ports, and retraining, as well as a mega tax credit for companies who commit to making a significant investment in the state.

These are just a few of the many issues still under consideration as the General Assembly enters its final weeks of work this year, but in my opinion are some of the most important as it pertains to keeping Georgia strong. Our future lies in the hands of the men and women elected to represent us at the state Capitol and we are confident they will make the right decisions.



**Whitfield's Dow plant makes green-friendly Styrofoam**

The utility bill is usually the second highest payment homeowners have each month behind their mortgage.

A new manufacturing process unveiled Wednesday at the Dow Chemical Co. Styrofoam insulation facility here aims to reduce those energy costs, while also improving the environment. The local facility is Dow's first plant to convert to the company's new zero ozone-depleting, no-VOC (volatile organic compound) foaming agent technology.

"The products that we make here in Dalton offset that (high energy bill)," said Mike McGaugh, vice president and general manager of Dow Building Solutions North America. "So not only are we not putting CO2 (carbon dioxide) out into the environment, we're allowing folks in the community that are struggling to make payments, like we all are, to afford more, which allows them to put more money into the economy."

Dow commissioned the site off Nance Springs Road in south Whitfield County in 1965 and has produced Styrofoam insulation there since 1988. The company plans to begin shipping the new insulation to customers by the end of the month.

"The Dalton plant's conversion is a milestone in our company's pursuit of practices and technologies that are environmentally sustainable and commercially viable," site leader Tim Thomas said. "Our products will deliver the same performance that builders have trusted for 60 years and offer an even 'greener' choice to builders designing energy efficient homes and buildings with rigid foam insulation."

The production capacity of the Dalton plant could save CO2 emissions equivalent to planting 700 million trees, taking 83,000 cars off the road for a year and reducing vehicle travel by 1.4 trillion miles (or more than 56 million trips around the world), while saving about 70 billion gallons of gasoline, Dow officials said. Those numbers are based on a maximum production capacity over 20 years with a product lifetime of 50 years.

Denise Wood, the Dalton City Council's liaison to the Dalton-Whitfield Regional Solid Waste Management Authority, said she was impressed, calling the project a "win-win."

Dow representatives planted a blue spruce — blue being the color of the Styrofoam insulation — to commemorate the plant's conversion.

This is the second project Dow has undertaken here to be more environmentally friendly. In July 2008, the company began a partnership with the Solid Waste Management Authority. Pipes carry methane gas naturally produced by trash at the Whitfield County landfill to the Dow plant two miles away. The gas is processed and converted to steam to power a boiler. That provides 50 percent of the facility's energy.

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

This deal occurred in a team contest at a recent regional tournament in Connecticut. It features a relatively rare play that enabled one of the declarers in a two-team match to bring in a slam that failed at the other table.

At the first table, declarer took East's jack of hearts with the ace and drew trumps ending in dummy. After discarding a heart on the ace of spades, South played the ace and another club, hoping East had the king. When West turned up with the K-J-5, the slam was down one.

At the other table, South, Warren Rosner, felt that given East's pre-emptive bid and West's raise, the chance that East held the king of clubs was not good, and that West was likely to have more clubs than East. If West held three or more clubs including the K-J-10, there was virtually no chance of making 12 tricks. But if West held the K-J-x or K-10-x, the slam could be made.

He began just as his counterpart had, winning the heart lead, drawing trumps and discarding his heart on the spade ace. But then, instead of cashing the ace of clubs, Rosner led a low club from dummy to his nine.

West won with the jack and returned a heart, ruffed by declarer, and it was here that South made his bid for fame and glory. Still assuming that West had the club king and more clubs than East, he led the queen, hoping East had started with the 10-x.

It did not matter whether West covered with the king or not. Either way, South could not lose a second club trick, and the slam was home.

"Peachtree and Harrison are two of the best teams in the state and have such big leads it will be really tough to catch either one of them. You always want to win, but anytime you can finish in the top three with a

group of teams like this, you'd have to feel pretty good about that."

Zane McDade led the Bruins on Tuesday with a 4-over par 75, while Hunter Keener and Jordan Black each shot a 76 and David Lomax an 81.

Still in the shakeout phase of a young season, McGrew is figuring out which roles that best fit his players.

"Some of them are going to have roles they haven't had before," McGrew said. "I want to find out how they're going to respond."

# Follow the NCAA from A down to Z

A quick alphabetical trip through the dizzying field of 64 teams for this year's NCAA men's basketball tournament, which starts today:

- **A** is for the Atlantic Coast Conference, the field's blue blood with three of the past eight national champs and nine Final Four teams this decade. But beware. ACC teams not named North Carolina are just 14-14 in the tournament the past three years.

- **B** is for Binghamton, which makes its NCAA debut against Duke tonight. Get ready for BU alum-ESPN personality Tony Kornheiser to talk up the 22-point underdog Bearcats.

- **C** is for Connecticut coach Jim "Moneybags" Calhoun, the richest man in college basketball. Thanks to his recent tirade, we now know he makes "way more" than \$1.6 million a year. That salary won't look good when the Huskies — 0-5 in postseason games since 2006 — become the first No. 1 seed out.

- **D** is for the difference between a No. 1 and No. 2 seed. In the past four years, all 16 No. 1s made it to the Sweet 16. Only nine of the 16 No. 2s made it that far.

- **E** is for Virginia Commonwealth's Eric Maynor, the top scorer in the field at 22.4 points per game. Two years ago, Maynor sank Duke in the final seconds. Beware UCLA, which takes on Maynor and the Rams tonight.

- **F** is for the 14 No. 1 seeds that have won it all since 1987. And at least one No. 1 seed has made it to every Final Four since 1990 except in 2006, when none made it.

- **G** is for Oklahoma forward Blake Griffin, the best overall player in the field. Unfortunately, the second-seeded Sooners (27-5)

haven't been the same since Griffin suffered a concussion in late February, and they won't make it past the Sweet 16.

- **H** is for Akron guard Anthony "Humpty" Hitchens, the 5-foot-9-inch freshman (8.9 points and 2.3 assists per game) who has the coolest nickname in the field.

- **I** is for the injustice of the plodding Big Ten getting seven teams in. Michigan (20-13) and Minnesota (22-10) belong in the NIT.

- **J** is for Jarvis Varnado, the 6-9 Mississippi State center who leads the nation with 4.7 blocks per game.

- **K** is for Kansas, the only team with a chance to repeat. Look for the underrated Jayhawks (25-7) to make a surprisingly deep run — all the way to the Final Four.

- **L** is for Louisville coach Rick Pitino, the only coach to ever guide three different schools


Murray (1-7-1) took five shots on goal.

But there is one Saturday each season when they don't quite agree. Like his dad, Eric, Bryson is a Georgia Bulldogs fan. Like his dad, Tim, Dylan is a Tennessee Volunteers fan. Each are big enough supporters that their bedrooms are decked out in team gear.

Uh-oh?  
"No, they get along great," Eric said. "It's just fun and sport to those guys."

Said Tim: "They meet in the middle. They're fine. Both are real good boys."

But they're not above a little bit of needling. Courtesy of Georgia's 26-14 victory in October, Bryson has bragging rights for at least a few more months. And judging from this conversation Wednesday afternoon, he probably plans to use them.

The question: "Who's your favorite player?"

Dylan: "Eric Berry."  
Bryson: "Can I pick two? Knowshon Moreno and Herschel Walker."

Dylan: "Mine's Eric Berry because he knocked the snot out of Knowshon Moreno."

# Chief makes name known

Let's start with the name. Everybody else does.

"People just call me Blick," Drew Blicksederfer says with a laugh. "It's just a lot easier."

Besides, getting through his last name might take too long, and the 32-year-old rookie crew chief for Matt Kenseth's No. 17 Ford doesn't have a lot of free time these days. Winning the Daytona 500 will do that.

It's been kind of a whirlwind month since Kenseth, Blicksederfer and team owner Jack Roush celebrated under the rain-soaked confetti at Daytona.

Kenseth backed it up with a win a week later in California. Suddenly Blicksederfer, who caught the racing bug from his grandfather and uncle while growing up in central Illinois, found himself being dubbed "Mr. Perfect."

The perfect run ended six laps into the race at Las Vegas, and Kenseth enters this weekend's Sprint Cup race at Bristol fifth in points after a 12th-place finish at Atlanta.

Bumps aside, there is little doubt of Blicksederfer's impact. The former college wrestler who took over as Kenseth's crew chief last December has given the team a much-needed confidence boost.

"It just felt like the right move," Kenseth said. "We've always had a really great group of guys here, but

you're got to have the whole thing. I just felt like that was the spark that was going to help us be more competitive and work better."

Blicksederfer's impact goes beyond team-building. With him at the top of the pit box, it has freed former crew chief Chip Bolin to go back to doing what he does best: build fast race cars.

"Chip didn't have an engineer to help him most of the year," Kenseth said. "He was trying to be the engineer and the crew chief and that was just way to much."

The formula simply didn't work. Kenseth managed to make the Chase but was never a factor, finishing 11th in the season standings and going winless for the first time since 2001.

Now Bolin spends the week tweaking the car while

Blicksederfer handles the crew. The two then bounce ideas off each other when they get to the track, but Blicksederfer knows his role is more focused getting the crew ready for Sunday.

It's a role he thrives in, one he had plenty of time to study for while growing up as the son of a coach.

Jack Blicksederfer has been involved in high school basketball for decades, and the father's competitiveness rubbed off on his son. So did a knack for putting people in places where they can succeed.

"As a coach you have to distinguish which team members are middle line-backer types and which are quarterback types, which can take a loud voice and which ones need a pick-me-up," said Blicksederfer, who preferred football to basketball.

• **P** is for Patriot League champ American. And if anyone cares, the Patriot topped the nation in graduation rates last year.

• **Q** is quit whining about expanding the field any more than the 65 teams

it actually includes with the play-in game, which Morehead State won 58-43 against Alabama State on Tuesday. This event actually works just the way it is.

• **R** is for the phenomenal tourney record 61 points Notre Dame's Austin Carr put up 39 years ago, minus a shot clock or 3-point line. David Robinson's 50 in 1987 is the closest anybody has come since.

• **S** is for Syracuse guard Jonny Flynn, who logged an amazing 181 minutes played in the Orange's Big East tourney run. At 17 points, six assists and three rebounds a game, the 6-0 sophomore is the field's best little man.

• **T** is for the three lonely teams from the SEC, none seeded higher 8th — LSU, (lowest ever for an SEC regular-season champ), No. 9 Tennessee and No. 13 Mississippi State. But hey, spring football practice has already started.

reliever Freddy Garcia in the sixth.

Hernandez scattered five hits and allowed just one run. The right-hander lowered his ERA to 3.07 in 14 2/3 innings this spring.

"(Hernandez) was pretty good," Mets manager Jerry Manuel said. "He has a good presence about him on the mound, and in the dugout he brings a different energy."

"He's put himself in a good position."

Relying primarily on his sinker, Hernandez came nowhere close to his pregame pitch count of 85 before handing a 2-1 lead to Garcia.

**USOC has laid off 54 at 'every level'**

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — The U.S. Olympic Committee laid off 54 employees Wednesday as a key part of its plan to trim its budget by 5 percent to deal with rough economic times.

The layoffs equal 13 percent of the USOC work force and will come at every level, including senior management, according to a news release sent by the federation. There were no specifics on who was losing jobs.

The USOC's goal is to trim its 2009 operating budget from \$142.6 million to \$135.5 million. Layoffs will affect the USOC's main operation in Colorado Springs, as well as offices in Lake Placid, N.Y. and Chula Vista, Calif.

**Goodyear to test twice more at Indy**

CONCORD, N.C. — Goodyear will return to Indianapolis Motor Speedway for at least two more tire tests before NASCAR races at the track in July.

Tire troubles turned last year's race at Indianapolis into a debacle, and NASCAR had to throw a caution every 10 to 12 laps to force teams to pit for fresh tires rather than risking an on-track failure.

Goodyear has already had two tests at Indianapolis, and will return with four teams in late April for additional work. Goodyear will then invite at least 12 teams to the track in June for another test session.

The Allstate 400 is scheduled for July 26.

Greg Stucker, director of race tire sales, said Goodyear was pleased with the tire it used earlier this month at Las Vegas and wants to apply some of the characteristics of that tire compound to the Indianapolis product.


